March Is Reading Month



Reading is important for everyone. The joy of sharing books is a gift you can give yourself and your children from the time they are born. Most avid readers acquire their love of reading at home from their parents. The best readers are those who love to read. Encourage your child to form a habit of lifelong reading. See page 4.

Reading is equally important for adults. Research shows that people may keep growing brain cells as they age. Stimulating activities such as reading may help preserve mental acuity and slow the development of dementia. Exercise your brain! Read books in print, ebooks or listen to audio books.

- ♣ Set aside time each day to turn off the TV & turn on to books.
- ♣ Read out loud to your family, even if little children only "read the pictures."
- ♣ Reduce stress by having a peaceful silent reading time.
- ♣ Listen to an audio book during dinner, chores or in the car.
- ♣ Read and record a favorite book to share with your grandchildren.
- ♣ Read humorous books.
- ♣ Laughter increases white blood cell activity and changes the chemical balance of the blood boosting the body's production of the chemicals needed for alertness and memory.
- ♣ Laughter reduces stress and low stress enhances the brain's receptivity to learning.

SDL is a member of White Pine Library Cooperative's digital consortium, Fuel Your Mind, to provide digital services. Go to SDL's website and click on the Libby icon to download the Libby App. To access your account:

- 1) Choose SDL as your home library.
- 2) Enter your 14 digit library card number.
- 3) Enter your PIN (your last name in lower case letters).

Add Other Content Groups To Your SDL Libby Account

Log into your Libby account and select "Menu" (the center button) on the toolbar at the bottom of the screen.

1. Under "Your Libraries" click "Add Library"
2. In the text box asking for Library Name begin typing the name of one of the above content groups
3. Click on the library card icon next to the name of the content group you wish to add to your account
4. Click "Sign In With My Card"
5. Click on Sanilac District Library
6. Enter your library card number and PIN. Click "Sign In"
7. Repeat steps 1 - 6 until each Content Group is added.
8. Content groups only have to be added to your account *one time*. Once added, Libby automatically searches all the Content Groups in your account.

- *Heroes*—Alan Gratz. Aboard the battleship, USS Utah with their Navy pilot fathers during WWII when the ship is attacked by the Japanese, Frank and Stanley find their friendship and dreams in jeopardy when Stanley is seen as the "enemy" because his mother is Japanese American.
- *The Thirteenth Circle*—Marcykate Connolly. Cat know aliens are real and is determined to prove it. She partners with Dani to study crop circles. But Dani secretly aims to disprove Cat's theory. During their investigations they discover something strange and dangerous rivals who will stop at nothing to achieve their goal.

Middle School

- *First State of Being*—Erin Kelly. When Ridge, a time-traveling teenager from the future, gets trapped in 1999, he befriends Michael, a lonely boy, changing the course of their lives forever.
- *Jennifer Chan Is Not Alone*—Tae Keller. Mallory knows middle school rules. The most important one? You have to fit in to survive. Then Jennifer moves across the street and that rule doesn't seem to apply. Jennifer doesn't care what other kids think. She believes in aliens and thinks she can find them. Then she goes missing. Mallory goes searching. But she has to confront why Jennifer might have run away and face the truth within herself.

Books For Teens

- *Above The Black: Sky's End #1* — Marc Gregson. Exiled to live as a Low, Conrad never knew anything existed below the toxic black clouds of the Skylands... until now. He endures the Gauntlet, a brutal test that yields riches to the skyship crew that kills the most gorgantauns.
- *The Atlas of Us*—Kristin Dwyer. Atlas has lost her way. In an effort to pull her life together, she's working on a community service program rehabbing trails in the Western Sierras. The days are so exhausting that Atlas is tired enough to forget that this was one of her dad's favorite places in the world. Before cancer stole him from her. As she sheds the lies she's built up as walls to protect herself, she realizes that these strangers on her team know her better than anyone.
- *Hamlet Is Not OK*—R. A. Spratt. Selby would do anything to escape the tedium of school, her parents' bookshop and busybodies. She didn't plan to read Hamlet. She is transported into the cold crime-ridden play where she meets Hamlet heavy with grief. In her world, Selby is used to feeling overlooked. But in the bloody backstabbing world of Shakespeare, Selby's good conscience and courage might save lives. Hopefully before Hamlet stabs one of her classmates.
- *Lady of Disguise*—Melanie Dickerson. A young maiden undergoes a journey to save her sister and herself. Will the chivalrous knight, Sir Charles, help her find the treasure she seeks before her uncle can marry her off?
- *The Light In Hidden Places*—Sharon Cameron. Catholic Stefania works in a Jewish family's grocery store. When the Nazis invade, the Diamants are sent to the ghetto. Stefania hides Jews in her attic, cares for her sister and tries to keep everything secret from the Nazi officers who are living in her house.
- *Snowglobe*—Soyoung Park. Chobahm discovers reality is a lie when she is given the opportunity to enter Snowglobe, the last place on Earth that's warm. In exchange for fame, fortune and safety the residents broadcast their lives 24/7 to the less fortunate outside.
