- *A Bright Young Thing*—Brienne Moore. In 1931 England, Astra must make her own way after her parents die leaving her buried in debt. She tests her brains, wit and mettle determined to prove that she's not an ordinary Bright Young Thing.
- *The Burning: Clay Edison series # 4*—Jonathan & Jesse Kellerman. A raging wildfire. A massive blackout. A wealthy man shot to death. For Clay Edison, it's all in a day's work. As a deputy coroner, caring for the dead, he speaks for those who cannot speak for themselves. While working the murder scene, Clay is horrified to discover a link to his brother who is fresh out of prison. And now he's gone AWOL. Is his brother a killer? Or a victim too?
- *Cloud Cuckoo Land*—Anthony Doerr. Children in peril try to survive in the city of Constantinople in 1453, in a public library in Idaho, today, and on a spaceship bound for a planet decades from now. From an ancient text, they all learn the story of Aethon who longs to be turned into a bird so that he can fly to the paradise of a better world.

- *The Dark Remains: Laidlaw's first case*—William McIlvanney & Ian Rankin
- *A Darker Reality: an Elena Standish novel #3*—Anne Perry
- *Defending Britta Stein*—Ronald Balson. Henryks, a restaurateur, is set to be honored for his civic and charitable contributions. Most people consider him a hero for his actions against the NAZIs during WWII. Britta Stein does not. The 90-year-old woman spray-paints "Collaborator," and "War Criminal" on the walls of his restaurant. She is arrested and sued by Henryks for defamation and intentional infliction of emotional distress. Attorney Catherine Lockhart and her investigator husband, Liam must reach back into wartime Denmark and locate evidence that proves Mrs. Stein's innocence.

- *Enemy At The Gates: a Mitch Rapp novel*—Vince Flynn (Kyle Mills). Mitch takes a job protecting Nicholas Ward, the worlds first trillionaire. He must keep the man alive, but also use him as bait to uncover a traitor with unlimited access to government secrets.

 1. Lucky agrees to her godmothers' request to promote Ever After, MO as a wedding destination by faking a marriage to her long-time ex.

- *The Girl Behind The Wall*—Mandy Robotham. When the Berlin Wall goes up, Karin is on the wrong side of the city. Overnight, she is trapped under Soviet rule in unforgiving East Berlin and separated from her twin sister, Jutta. The sisters lead parallel lives for years. But Karin finds one reason to keep going: Otto, the man who gives her hope, even amidst the brutal regime. When Jutta finds a hidden ways through the wall, the twins are reunited. But the Stasi have eyes everywhere and soon Karin is faced with a terrible decision: to flee to the West and be with her sister or sacrifice it all to follow her heart.

- *An Impossible Promise: a Providence Falls novel #2*—Jude Deveraux. Liam must restore the balance of fate and push the woman he loves into the arms of another man. The Irish rogue unknowingly changed the course of destiny when he fell in love with Cora McLeod over a century ago.

- *The Slow March of Light*—Heather Moore. Bob is an American spy working undercover in East Germany during the 1960s when he is taken prisoner. He survives the ordeal by maintaining his hope in the face of despair, and by committing himself to return alive to the girl he loves. Based on a true story
- *So We Meet Again*—Suzanne Park
- *The Stolen Lady: a novel of WWII and the Mona Lisa*—Laura Morelli. Separated by 500 years, two women--Anne Guichard, a young archivist at the Louvre, who tries to treasures safe from the Nazis; and house servant, Bellina Sardi, who keeps an impossible secret--each hide Leonardo da Vinci's Mona Lisa with unintended consequences.
- *Striking Range: a Timber Creek K-9 mystery*—Margaret Mizshima
- *A Suitable Boy*—Vikram Seth. Her matchmaker mother attempt to find a suitable husband for Lata through love or maternal appraisal. Set in India and involving the lives of four large families, the book is a panoramic exploration of the Indian continent.

- *We Are Not Like Them*—Christine Pride & Jo Piazza. The friendship between two women, one black and one white, is tested by a tragic event. After years of trying, Jen is finally pregnant. Riley is poised to become an anchor on a top news channel. Jen's husband, a city police officer, is involved in the shooting of an unarmed black teenager. Jen is in freefall as her future, her husband's freedom and her friendship with Riley are thrown into uncertainty. Covering this career-making story, Riley wrestles with the implications of this incident for her community, her ambitions and her relationship with her lifelong friend.

- *When The Stars Go Dark*—Paula McLain. Anna is a seasoned missing persons detective. When tragedy strikes her personal life, Anna flees to the village where she spent summers with her beloved grandparents. The day she arrives, she learns a teen is missing. A childhood friend, now the sheriff, pleads for her help. Another girl is abducted. The crimes are reminiscent of a string of unsolved murders that happened when she was a child. As past and present collide, Anna realizes her experiences have led her to this moment.

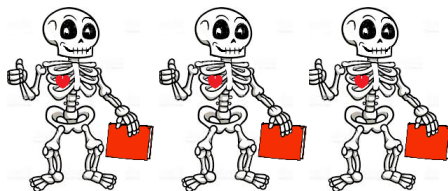

Books For Teens

- *Ashfall Legacy*—Pittacus Lore. Half-alien Sydney leaves Earth to seek his long-missing father, and unearths a devastating, centuries-old secret about humanity.
- *Beasts of Prey*—Ayana Gray. Indentured beastkeeper Koffi and warrior Ekon forge an alliance and venture into the Greater Jungle to hunt down a monster that has been menacing their city for a century.
- *In The Wild Light*—Jeff Zentner. When Delaney wins a scholarship to an elite prep school, she insists that Cash also be included. Cash has lost his mother. He loves hiking and canoeing in the mountains. He must decide to leave behind his place of heart or support his person on heart.
- *Lies Like Wildfire*—Jennifer Lynn Alverez. When Hannah and her best friends accidentally spark an enormous and deadly wildfire, their instinct is to lie, but as the blaze roars through their town, Hannah's friends crack and one ends up missing.
- *Pretty Funny For A Girl*—Rebecca Elliott. Haylah is an ace best friend and an incredibly patient sister to a nutcase brother. She is learning to embrace her curviness & hopes to be comedian. So when thirstalicious Leo reveals he's also into comedy, Haylah jumps at the chance to ghost-write his sets. But is Leo interested in returning the favor?
- *Stargirl*—Jerry Spinelli.

1. *Stargirl*: Strange and mysterious, Stargirl, changes Mica High School forever. At first the other students are enchanted by her. At first. Then they turn on her. Stargirl is suddenly shunned for everything that makes her different in this story about the perils of popularity, the courage of nonconformity and the thrill of first love.
 2. *Love, Stargirl*: Still moping months after being dumped by her boyfriend, Stargirl, a home-schooled free spirit, writes "the world's longest letter" to Leo, describing her new life in Pennsylvania.

- *White Bird: A Wonder Story*—R. J. Palacio (a graphic novel). The story of Julian's Grandmother's childhood as she, a Jewish girl, was hidden by a family in a Nazi-occupied French village during World War II and how the boy she once shunned became her savior and best friend.
